


Activity 1

OLD MAN OF THE WOODS




- What is the ogre doing? Why?




Activity 3

Subordinating Conjunctions

Here are 10 of the most common subordinating conjunctions. They are used at the beginning of a subordinating clause which is a clause that doesn't make sense on its own.



For example, **Although** it was raining, I still wanted to go out for a walk.

'Although it was raining' doesn't make sense as a sentence on its own so it is called a 'clause'.

Other examples:

My dad sprinted to the supermarket **because** he needed to buy icecream for our pudding.

The girl was terrified **until** she saw the magical purple bird swooping towards her with the red crayon.

As the boat drifted lazily towards the castle, the girl spotted soldiers waving from the turrets.

Write a sentence for each conjunction. Remember that the conjunction comes at the start of a clause. The clause doesn't make sense as a sentence on its own. You could use the Journey to give you inspiration for your sentences.
