Friday 8th May 2020 marks 75 years since VE (Victory in Europe) Day, when the Second World War came to an end in Europe.

The May Bank Holiday had been moved to mark this 75th Anniversary and many celebrations had been planned, however, due to the present circumstances, many of these are now unable to happen. Design a VE Day Medal:

This medal celebrated the end of the First World War and was given to soldiers who had fought in active theatres of the war. It was a symbol of great pride but its design was also highly symbolic.



Bronze medal, not too expensive after the war, but long lasting.




Your task is to create a medal for British soldiers who served in the Second World War that is just as symbolic and creative.


Your medal can be any shape or size but you must have considered the metal and ribbon choices.

You must include:

- The years of the war (1939-45)
- · The colours of the Allies
- A symbol to signify the war and the soldier's sacrifice and victory
- A reference to the many theatres of the fighting (Europe, Africa, Asia, Air, Sea, Land)
- · Annotations to explain your choices



Write or translate a message in Morse Code

Morse code is a way to send messages without using words. The code has its own alphabet made up of short and long sounds or flashes of light. These are represented by the dots and dashes.
