Your comprehension task this week is 'The Big 5' task.

English - lesson 1 and 2

LO: Can I understand the layout of a non-fiction text?

What does fiction mean? What does non-fiction mean? Explain the differences. Explain that today we are going to look at some non-fiction texts and remind ourselves of the features.

Task 1: Have a look at a range of non-fiction texts that you have at home. What is similar? What is different? Go through the features below:

- Title
- Contents page
- Glossary
- Index
- Heading
- Sub-headings
- Pictures
- Diagrams
- Captions
- Paragraphs
- Page numbers
- Labels

Discuss where they can be found, their importance and compare between books.

Explain that this week, we are going to create our own non-fiction text about 'The Big 5'.

<u>**Task 2:**</u> Collect facts from the video provided *(the YouTube link is on first homework page, under the comprehension/topic starter section)* and by doing your own research if you need to. We practised collecting some facts last week, about an insect, so you need to collect your notes in the same way - no long sentences, just key information and bullet points.

Year 1: Choose one animal to focus on.

Year 2: Choose to focus on at least 2 animals – you will then be able to compare them.

Your fact collecting sheet is on the next page.





English - lesson 3 and 4 LO: Can I use the features of a non-fiction text correctly?

What are the features of a non-fiction text? Recall the features you found in the text examples and explain that now we have more facts, we are going to make our own non-fiction text.

Resources needed:

- A4 or A3 paper (this can be folded if you would like to make a book rather than 1 fact sheet)
- Photographs and/or diagrams that link to your chosen animal
- Optional different coloured pieces of paper, cut into different sizes, to use to help reinforce each feature. For example, a page heading could be in pale orange, a sub-heading could be pink, paragraphs could be pale blue, and captions could be pale green.
- Your fact sheet from the previous lesson.
